# Introduction to New Testament Greek 1 (LG-561) Fall 2021

The focus of this introductory course, which assumes no prior knowledge of the Greek language, is on the basic grammar and vocabulary of New Testament Greek. Students will begin reading selected passages of the New Testament.

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## **Course Syllabus**

Class will meet Tuesdays from 4 to 5:50 p.m., starting on Thursday September 9, 2021 to Tuesday, December 21, 2021. There will be no class on November 23 or 25 – as these fall in our reading week (and Thanksgiving).

**Evaluation** Evaluation for the introductory track will include the following: Class participation 10%; Weekly Quizzes 20 %; Midterm Exam 30%; Final Exam 40%.

**The Aim of the Course** The focus of this introductory course, which assumes no prior knowledge of the Greek language, is on the basic grammar and vocabulary of New Testament Greek. As the course progresses in the Spring semester, students will begin reading selected passages of the New Testament.

**Course Requirements** It is strongly recommended, though not required, that students arrive at the first class already having learned and practiced writing the letters of the Greek alphabet. This alphabet can be found on page 2 of the required textbook, Essentials of New Testament Greek, by Ray Summers, revised by Thomas Sawyer.

**Assessment Criteria** Work will be graded according to the Hartford Seminary Grading Guidelines. These will be distributed to students at the beginning of the semester.
